阅读理解之记叙文

1、记叙文是以记叙、描写为主要表达方式,以记人、叙事、写景、状物为主要内容的文章,简单点说就是记录
 事情从开始到经过到结果的文章。

记叙文四要素:人物 时间 地点 事件(起因 经过 结果)

2、记叙文考查特点:

- 1) 多考查细节和主旨;
- 2) 首段或尾段为议论抒情句, 往往点明文章主旨;

3、解题思路和技巧

- 先读题后读文。读题时注意从题干中找出"题眼"(即题干关键词),带着问题读文,使阅读具有明确的目标。
 - 由于记叙文中多人物,地点,人物线索,题干中多有大写信息,所以很多题可以直接通过快速定位法查 找到文章相应部分,快速解题。
- 2、读文章时,找主题句,找首段或尾段的议论、抒情句。整体把握文章的主要内容和中心意思。
- 记叙文多为总—分—总结构,主旨会出现在首尾,即首段明主旨或尾段点题或首尾呼应;且要先做主旨题,便于猜测和把握细节内容。
- 3、答题时,具体题目涉及到相关段落,要对这些段落反复研读。


