

Western Table Etiquette



### Setting the Table



Forks and knots should be placed on the left side of the plate, with the fork closed to the edge and the knot on top



The spoon should be placed on the right side of the plate, with the handle fixing towards the center



The water glass should be placed above the knife, with the top of the glass at the center of the plate



The bread plate should be placed above the fork, with the handle fixing towards the center



The napkin should be unfolded and placed on the left side of the plate, or on the lap if a tablet is used



#### Order of Placing Food on the Plate



The main course should be placed in the center of the plate, with the process closed to the fork and the start further away

Side dishes and vegetables should be placed around the main course, with sage on the side





Dessert should be placed on a separate plate, if possible


