- Foster a spirit of inquiry and analysis through engagement with primary sources, advanced digital technologies, events, and demonstrations
- Make student research widely visible and accessible

Embrace Alternative Roles

Engage Faculty & Students in Library Research Commons

- Characterized as interdisciplinary, collaborative, socially engaged, global in focus, timely and relevant
- Laboratory space with robust technology and a variety of gathering spaces, including remote access and conferencing
- Support the whole life-cycle of research
- Transformative scholarship and pedagogy
- User-driven usage drawing on extensive and rich library resources and data
- Ability to capture and record versions, snapshots, and product (publications, exhibits, versions) throughout the creative process

Create New Spaces That Support and Encourage Engagement

- Targets scholars at all stages of their careers who are actively engaged in digitally enabled research
- Those who are preparing digital publications and/or teaching courses that rely on geotemporal analysis and argumentation
- Librarians take the opportunity to work closely with faculty and staff
- Position the library as a full partner and place where things happen



Use the Unique Resources of the Library Collection

- Engage graduate students in developing interactive online exhibition exploring topics that draw from special collections, such as historic children's books or manuscripts documenting ancient Chinese culture
- It is an exhibit inside of a textbook
- It's not about use, but about building and making new resources
- Draws on the resources of library special collections and engages with original artifacts


